Goals

The goals of the Washington State Exemplary Substance Abuse Prevention Awards are to:

- Recognize outstanding community partners including youth engaged in substance abuse prevention efforts.
- Focus statewide attention on exceptional substance abuse prevention work.
- **Identify exemplary substance abuse prevention programs with exceptional outcomes** that can be adopted or adapted by others.

Application Procedures

Nominations may be submitted via email, or fax. The Nomination Application begins on page 5 of this packet. Keep in mind that the review committee will have only the information that you provide to assess the nominee's suitability for an award. Please be thorough yet succinct. Nominations with missing or otherwise incomplete information will not be successful. Only required application materials will be reviewed. Attachments with supporting information will not be reviewed.

Categories

- 2016 Lt. Governor Brad Owen Award Youth Leadership group or individual
- Exemplary Prevention Professional and/or Exemplary Community Prevention Leader
- Exemplary Tribal Prevention Leader Representative and/or Tribal Community Prevention Leader
- Exemplary Community Coalition with emphasis on substance abuse prevention
- Exemplary Substance Abuse Prevention Program demonstrating exemplary outcomes

Criteria for Awards

- 2016 Lt. Governor Brad Owen Youth Leadership: (up to two nominations will be selected from this category)
 The title of the 2016 exemplary youth award recognizes Lt. Governor Owen's support for youth substance abuse prevention initiatives and for his many years officiating the Washington State Exemplary Prevention Awards.
 To be considered for the award, nominees must be strong prevention advocates who demonstrate good peer leadership, teamwork, and volunteerism. Nominees must have regularly participated in community and/or school prevention activities for a minimum of one year.
- Exemplary Substance Abuse Prevention Professional or Exemplary Community Prevention Leader (sector representative): (up to two nominations will be selected from this category)
 To be considered for one of these awards nominated individuals must be strong prevention advocates.
 Nominators should demonstrate the nominee's leadership best practice service delivery, community involvement in relation to the community coalition's strategic plan, and their commitment to substance abuse prevention.
- Exemplary Tribal Substance Abuse Prevention Professional and/or Exemplary Tribal Community Prevention
 Leader: (up to two nominations will be selected from this category)
 To be considered for this award, nominated individuals must be strong prevention leaders in their Tribal
 community. Nominators should demonstrate the nominee's leadership in best practice service delivery,
 community involvement in prevention efforts, and their commitment to substance abuse prevention.
- Exemplary Community Coalition: (up to one nomination will be selected from this category)
 To be considered for one of these awards, nominated coalitions or organizations must be strong prevention advocates. Nominators should demonstrate the nominee's leadership and community partnerships for best practice prevention service delivery, community involvement in relation to the community coalition's strategic plan, and their commitment to substance abuse prevention.
- Exemplary Substance Abuse Prevention Program: (up to one nomination will be selected from this category)
 To be considered for the award, program nominations must address all elements in question two (2), page five (5) to substantiate the following:
 - o Be in operation for a minimum of one year.
 - O Be focused on evidence-based substance abuse prevention. Programs that include both prevention and treatment must clearly detail the prevention component. Expected outcomes or areas of focus should include, but are not limited to, decreasing high-risk use of alcohol and drugs by adults; eliminating use of illicit drugs; preventing alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use; and reducing experimentation by young people. Program does not have to be listed as a nationally recognized Evidence-Based Practice; however it must have evidence-based research to support its goals and outcomes.
 - Describe the evaluation plan and how outcome data is applied to improve program design and implementation.
 - Document and demonstrate success in the form of outcome data obtained through verifiable processes.
 - Describe how the program design has considered <u>each</u> of the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention's (CSAP) Principles of Substance Abuse Prevention in the appropriate domain. Selection Process

A review committee with representatives from DSHS/DBHR, Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction, Washington State Department of Health, Washington Traffic Safety Commission, Washington State Liquor Control Board, Washington Association for Substance Abuse & Violence Prevention, and the Prevention Specialist Certification Board of Washington will conduct a review process. Reviewers will evaluate and select nominations

based on the stated criteria and information provided. Every attempt will be made to ensure that awardees represent a range of demographic, ethnic, cultural, and geographic areas.

Benefits of the Substance Abuse Prevention Exemplary Awards

Awardees will be honored on November 7th at the 2016 Washington State Prevention Summit in Yakima, Washington. The awards will recognize the efforts of dedicated individuals, successful programs, and supportive organizations; celebrate their successes; and share their strategies with others in the field. Additional benefits may include local recognition and a greater ability to market programs, recruit volunteers, and leverage other resources to support their work. Programs that seem suited to the rigorous national standards will be encouraged to apply for the national awards.
